Overview of DDAP



History of DDAP



- Formerly an office, then a bureau, under the Department of Health
- Act 50 of 2010 created the Department
- Single State Authority (SSA) for substance use disorder services since July 1, 2012



DDAP's Role

- Receives federal and state funding to address SUD prevention, intervention, treatment and recovery within the Commonwealth
- Develops and implements a state level strategic plan
- Funds and monitors 47 Single County Authorities (SCAs) as the local entities to implement services
- Provides training for the SUD workforce and community organizations
- Implements state level initiatives to address identified needs and improve quality of services
- Licenses drug and alcohol treatment facilities and recovery houses



Strategic Plan 2019 – 2022 Goals: RISE

- Reduce stigma
 - Intensify primary prevention
- Strengthen treatment systems
- Empower sustained recovery






Current Landscape in PA





Prevention and Intervention Initiatives



Expanded Prevention Funding

Over \$11 million in prevention funding provided to SCAs

Examples of programs funded across PA:

- Student Assistance Program liaison services
- Evidence-based school curricula to build skills (e.g. Botvin LifeSkills Training, Too Good for Drugs)
- Parenting programs (including home visiting programs)
- Youth leadership development/advocacy
- Supporting prevention coalitions
- Cognitive Behavioral Intervention for Trauma in Schools



Student Assistance Program (SAP)

SAP helps your child overcome barriers to achieve, advance, and remain in school.



- Required K-12 for public schools
- Team process to mobilize resources to remove barriers to learning
- 4 phase process: Referral; Team Planning; Intervention/Recommendations;
 Support/Follow-up
- SCAs fund: liaison services; training; technical assistance; marketing



Student Assistance Program (SAP)

SAP can help youth experiencing:

- Drop in grades
- Being bullied
- Problems with peers
- Change in mood
- Lack of motivation
- Substance use issues


- Grief and loss
- Feeling anxious
- Truancy
- Sleep issues
- Discipline issues
- Other concerns



PA Youth Survey (PAYS)

- Survey youth in 6th, 8th, 10, 12th grades
- Administered in fall of odd-numbered years
- Collects data on substance use, mental health and other problem behaviors
- Measures risk and protective factors that influence behaviors
- 2021 Findings: Continued decline in teen substance use

Women-Women with Dependent Children Network

Pregnant women and women with children are a priority population

Women-Women with Dependent Children Network (W3DC) Purpose:

- Represent the "voice" of women in identifying barriers and establishing solutions to improved service delivery
- Improve collaboration among partners providing services to pregnant and parenting women
- Identify needs and improve access to resources

Parent Panel Advisory Council



Mission and Background

- **Mission:** It is the mission of the Pennsylvania Parent Panel Advisory Council, working in collaboration with the Commonwealth Department of Drug and Alcohol Programs, to advocate for and promote individual and family recovery, hope and healing by improving the understanding and access to, a continuum of care and supports for those who are impacted by substance use and substance use disorders throughout Pennsylvania.
- Established in 2006 pursuant to the Pennsylvania General Assembly passage of <u>House</u> <u>Resolution (HR) 585</u>.
- Comprised of geographically dispersed individuals, representing all regions of the Commonwealth, who have first-hand experience parenting children impacted by substance use and substance use disorders.



Meetings and Membership

PPAC meets three times annually in the Harrisburg area, designating one of these meetings as a joint session with the Pennsylvania Advisory Council on Substance Use.

Stigma Reduction



Life Unites Us Campaign Objective

Increase knowledge about and decrease stigma around those living with substance use disorder (SUD), specifically opioid use disorder (OUD) throughout Pennsylvania.



Knowledge

Increasing knowledge about OUD and that recovery is possible with the proper support



Attitudes

Improving attitudes toward those living with and/or in recovery



Behaviors

Increasing self-efficacy to provide support, and/or instances of providing support among those who have a loved one with OUD



Collective Impact Model

1. Connect and strengthen stakeholders (organizations and individuals) already responding to the crisis

Collaborated with over 80 orgs across Pennsylvania who endorse the campaign.

- 2. Integrate with Pennsylvania's existing plan
 Expanded messaging from only OUD to poly-use
 and stimulant education as state priorities shift.
- 3. Educate the public using channels and messengers that meet them where they are

Published over 270 stories on Life Unites Us social channels and story library. Activated 50 influencers for a larger reach of messaging.

4 Evaluate the entire effort as a public health intervention, not a media campaign

Evaluated stigma reduction every 6 months.

Partnership and CBO Engagement



Campaign Partners

 80 community based organizations (CBOs) partnering with the campaign through logo endorsement or sharing campaign content with their networks



Community Impact Committee

- 6 members of the newly expanded CIC representing 5 regions of the state
- This committee includes voices from the recovery community and regions across the commonwealth to ensure representation across priority groups



Technical Training

- Offering bi-monthly webinars to provide deeper support
- Topics are identified by partners as areas of interest
- Providing social media and campaign support upon request

Year One Results

Year One Results

- ✓ Reached nearly 4 million Pennsylvanians
- ✓ Found greater willingness to live with and continue a relationship with someone who has an opioid use disorder
- ✓ Found greater openness to having an opioid treatment center located near their home

Policy	My local government has strong policies to support people with OUD	17.2%	35.5%
Medications	Buprenorphine (also called suboxone, subutex, or sublocade) is an effective treatment for opioid use disorder	25.8%	39.2%
Naloxone	I would be willing to obtain naloxone, a medication that can quickly help a person experiencing a life- threatening drug overdose	64.8%	82.8%
Social Exclusion	I would be willing to have a person with OUD as a neighbor	41.1%	52.2%
