FOREWORD

This 24th annual report summarizes the instructional outputs, instructional faculty salary costs, tuitions and Commonwealth instructional appropriations for Pennsylvania's State-related and State-owned universities--the Commonwealth's public universities.

The report is based primarily on data reported by Pennsylvania's public universities to the Pennsylvania General Assembly, as required by the annual appropriation acts for the State-related universities, and by the Public School Code for the State-owned universities. These data include student credit hours and degrees, and faculty salaries and workweek activities. The report includes instructional outputs and instructional faculty salaries, but does not include noninstructional faculty salaries. Therefore, average faculty salaries in the report cannot be compared to average faculty salaries from other sources. In addition, since the data do not include nonsalary expenditures, the report does not summarize total instructional costs for the universities. Data on tuitions, Commonwealth instructional appropriations, and student aid from other sources supplement the university data.

Levels of data for 1995-96 and data trends for 1990-91 to 1995-96 are presented. Readers are cautioned to use the current historical tables for prior years' data, as some data have been revised in these tables. Student credit-hour and salary data are combined for the computation of a measure of cost efficiency: instructional faculty salary cost per full-time equivalent student. Tuition and instructional appropriation data are combined for the computation of a measure of cost sharing: the percentage of total instructional revenues covered by instructional appropriations.

This report is intended for use by a variety of persons or groups: by legislators for making appropriation decisions; by university administrators for evaluating policies related to faculty outputs, salaries and workloads; and by Pennsylvania citizens, for making informed judgments about the levels and shares of costs related to public higher education in the Commonwealth.

I. DATA HIGHLIGHTS

- 1. In Fall 1995, a total of 571,355 full- and part-time students were enrolled in the 144 public and private colleges and universities in Pennsylvania. Of this total, 229,003 students (40 percent) were enrolled in the Commonwealth's public universities: 134,633 students (23.5 percent) in the 4 State-related universities, and 94,370 (16.5 percent) in the 14 State-owned universities. The main and branch campuses of Pennsylvania's public universities are listed on page iii. Compared to Fall 1994, overall student enrollments in all of Pennsylvania's colleges and universities remained about the same, but in the Commonwealth's public universities increased by about 1 percent.¹
- 2. During the 1995-96 school year,² over 5.9 million undergraduate and graduate student credit hours (SCH) were generated by the public universities. These SCH were the equivalent of 203,518 full-time students: 117,647 full-time equivalent (FTE) students (58 percent) for the State-related universities, and 85,871 (42 percent) for the State-owned universities.³ (Table 1) FTE students at the State-related universities increased by almost 2 percent, and at the State-owned universities decreased by about 1 percent, from the previous year. FTE students vary considerably by academic level at the individual

universities. For Pittsburgh⁴ and Temple, about three-quarters of the FTE students are undergraduates; both universities have first professional programs in dentistry and law. In contrast, the proportion of undergraduate FTE students is 85 percent for Lincoln, 90 percent for Penn State and 91 percent for the State-owned group.⁵ (Table 2) Likewise, the public universities offer diverse programs to students. Most of these universities continue to have large programs in education, in addition to letters and the social sciences. The State-owned universities each have specialized program missions. (Tables 3A through 3E)⁶

- 3. During the 1995-96 school year, the public universities conferred 40,954 bachelor's and graduate degrees (not including medical degrees): 23,440 degrees (57 percent) by the State-related universities, and 17,514 (43 percent) by the State-owned universities. Total degrees for the State-related universities decreased about 4 percent, and for the State-owned universities by almost 2 percent, from the preceding year.⁷ (Table 4)
- 4. Over the past five years (since 1990-91), Pennsylvania's population of 18- to 24-year-olds decreased by 13 percent, while FTE enrollments in public universities in the Commonwealth decreased by only 4 percent. The increase in FTE students in the public universities, relative to the population of traditional college-age residents, would appear to be attributable to a larger percentage of traditional students

⁶Tables 3A through 3E employ the Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP) taxonomy. This report utilizes an aggregation of two-digit CIP, each of which corresponds to one or more academic departments or program areas within individual universities. The CIP groupings are used to facilitate comparisons between universities, given the large array of departments and programs which exist in the Commonwealth's public universities.

attending the public universities, plus an increase in the enrollment of nontraditional students.

- 5. In Fall 1995, 10,617 teaching and research faculty were *employed full-time* by Pennsylvania's public universities: 5,890 full-time faculty (55 percent) by the State-related universities and 4,727 (45 percent) by the State-owned universities. The overall workweek reported by these faculty averaged 54.2 hours: 53.0 total hours for the State-related universities, and 55.8 total hours for the State-owned universities. Hours spent in undergraduate and graduate classroom and individual instruction contact with students averaged 8.8 per week for the State-related group, and 11.8 per week for the State-owned group. (Table 5) Since 1990-91, average total workweek hours for the State-related universities have increased by 2.1 percent and average student contact hours by 6.0 percent; over the same years, the average hours at the State-owned universities have increased by 1.3 percent and 0.9 percent, respectively.
- 6. During the 1995-96 school year, the *full-* and part-time instructional faculty employed by the public universities were the equivalent of 11,835 full-time faculty: 6,938 FTE instructional faculty (59 percent) for the State-related universities, and 4,897 (41 percent) for the State-owned universities.⁹ The combined FTE instructional faculty increased by less than 1 percent from the previous year. The instructional salary for these faculty averaged \$44,600 and \$53,300 for the two public university groups, respectively.¹⁰ The combined average instructional

salary increased by 3 percent from the previous year. The State-owned universities tend to utilize relatively more higher-ranked FTE faculty--professors and associate professors--in instruction than do the larger State-related universities. In contrast, Penn State, Pittsburgh and Temple provide a significant amount of instruction using instructors and nonranked faculty (largely graduate teaching assistants); the lower instructional salaries of the nonranked faculty tend to lower the average instructional salary for the State-related group relative to the State-owned group. (Table 6)

- 7. Since 1990-91, the average instructional salary for the FTE instructional faculty has increased by about \$8,200 (23 percent) for the State-related universities, and about \$13,100 (33 percent) for the State-owned universities. The relative increase in average instructional salary for the State-owned group has tended to widen the gap in average instructional salaries between the two groups of FTE faculty.
- 8. During the 1995-96 school year, the ratio of FTE students to FTE instructional faculty averaged 17.0 for the State-related universities (a one-year increase of 1 percent), and 17.5 for the State-owned universities (a one-year decrease of 1 percent). (Tables 1 and 6)
- 9. During the 1995-96 school year, the average instructional faculty salary costs per FTE student for the State-related group were: undergraduate level, \$1,990, and master's level, \$4,336. For the State-owned group the FTE instructional salary costs for these levels were \$2,943 and \$3,974, respectively. (Table 7) First professional FTE instructional salary costs averaged \$2,157 for Pittsburgh and \$3,759 for Temple; doctoral FTE instructional salary costs averaged \$11,798 for Penn State, \$12,444 for Pittsburgh, \$8,081 for Temple and \$7,310 for Indiana. Statistical analysis has shown that FTE instructional salary cost varies directly with FTE instructional faculty salaries, and inversely with both class (section) average sizes and the

¹¹Caveat. Average instructional salaries are computed by dividing each university's total instructional salaries for each academic rank by the respective number of FTE instructional faculty. Therefore, changes in average instructional salaries do *not* necessarily correspond to general salary changes for all faculty members in a given university. Average instructional salary changes also reflect changes in the rank distribution of faculty.

number of classes (sections) offered per course. Since 1990-91, undergraduate FTE instructional salary costs have increased by 30 percent for the State-related group, and by 41 percent for the State-owned group. FTE instructional salary costs also vary considerably by program area. (Table 8A through 8E)

- 10. Regression analysis applied to 1995-96 lower and upper division undergraduate FTE instructional salary cost, class size and instructional faculty salary data for the public universities indicates that the total cost savings to be expected from *decreasing* average FTE instructional faculty salaries by \$1,000 at these universities would be almost \$10 million, and from *increasing* average class (section) sizes by one student would be about \$18 million.¹²
- 11. The average undergraduate class (section) size is 18 for Lincoln, 29 for Penn State, 27 for Pittsburgh, 25 for Temple, and 22 for the State-owned universities. Since 1990-91, average undergraduate class sizes have declined by about 4 percent for both the State-related and the State-owned universities. (Table 9)
- 12. During the 1995-96 school year, the tuition and required fees for full-time in-State undergraduate students averaged \$5,091 for the State-related universities, and \$3,945 for the State-owned universities. These tuition and fees increased by 5 percent for both groups from the previous year. Lincoln's tuition and fees for nonresident full-time undergraduates exceeded those for residents by 55 percent, and for full-time graduate students by 61 percent. Penn State's tuition and fees for nonresident full-time undergraduates were 115 percent higher, and those for graduate students 105 percent higher than the tuition and fees for residents. Pittsburgh's nonresident tuition and fees were approximately double those for residents for both levels. For Temple, the out-of-state premium was almost 87 percent for full-time undergraduates and 41 percent for full-time graduate students. For the

State-owned group, tuition and fees for nonresident undergraduates exceeded those for residents by 126 percent; nonresident graduate students paid 67 percent more than Pennsylvania residents. (Table 10)

- 13. For fiscal year 1995-96, the public universities collected almost 1.2 billion dollars in tuition and fee revenues. These revenues per FTE student averaged \$5,810 for Lincoln, \$6,640 for Penn State, \$7,830 for Pittsburgh, \$6,960 for Temple, and \$4,290 for the State-owned universities. Since 1990-91, per student revenues for the State-related universities have grown by 34 percent and for the State-owned universities by 54 percent. (Table 11)
- 14. For fiscal year 1995-96, the Commonwealth's instructional appropriations to the public universities totaled \$886.2 million: \$492.5 million (56 percent) to the State-related universities and \$393.7 million (44 percent) to the State-owned universities. 13 14 appropriations represent 85 percent of the total appropriations made specifically for instruction to the public universities and community colleges, and about 73 percent of the total appropriations made for all purposes to all public and private colleges and universities in the Commonwealth. Total instructional appropriations, including Tuition Challenge Grants, increased by 3 percent for both the State-related and the State-owned universities from the previous year. The average appropriation per FTE student was \$4,190 for the State-related group (a one-year increase of 1 percent) and \$4,580 for the State-owned group (a one-year increase of 4 percent). (Table 12) In addition to the instructional appropriations made directly to the public universities, monies appropriated from the General Fund to the Pennsylvania Higher Education Assistance Agency totaling almost \$98 million went to students at the public universities through various PHEAA grant and matching-fund programs.¹⁵

¹⁴In this report, total educational and general appropriations and Tuition Challenge Grants are regarded as "instructional" and used for comparisons. Over the years, educational and general appropriations have been expanded to include expenditure categories which previously had been separate line items in the General Fund Budget.

- 15. For 1995-96 total instructional revenues per FTE student--tuition and fees plus instructional appropriations--averaged \$11,160 for the State-related universities and \$8,870 for the State-owned universities. (Table 13) Per student instructional revenues for the State-related universities were more than those for the State-owned universities, even though per student instructional faculty salary costs for the State-related group were less than those for the State-owned group. (Table 7) These results are apparently related to the State-related group's greater emphasis on departmental research and their use of graduate teaching assistants and other nonranked faculty to generate significant numbers of student credit hours. The analysis of *total* instructional costs is beyond the scope of this report.
- 16. During the 1995-96 school year, on an FTE student basis, the ratio of Commonwealth instructional appropriations to tuition and fee revenues plus Commonwealth instructional appropriations averaged 38 percent for the State-related university group, and 52 percent for the State-owned university group. (Table 13) Since 1990-91, on an FTE student basis, average tuition and fee revenues collected by the public universities have increased, on a percentage basis, more than twice as much as the average direct FTE student appropriation from the Commonwealth to these institutions. Hence, the percentage of total instructional revenues from Commonwealth appropriations has decreased, causing the student share of instructional cost to increase for all of the public universities.

APPENDIX: MODEL OF FTE SALARY COST DETERMINATION

Instructional faculty salary cost per student credit hour, for each academic level and each program area, can be expressed by the following model:

The two terms on the right-hand side of this equation illustrate the two different kinds of factors which determine FTE instructional salary cost.

The components of the first term are approximately *constants or constant relationships*. In the short run, neither the number of faculty per course nor the number of faculty per average course (assigned) credit value can be readily varied to influence FTE instructional salary cost.

The second term contains *control variables*: average FTE instructional faculty salary, average class (section) size, and the number of classes (sections) per course. To at least some degree, each of these variables can be controlled by university administrators to affect FTE instructional salary cost. Adjustments in the number of classes (sections) per course are an alternative to permitting average class sizes to change with changes in enrollment.

Average instructional faculty salary cost per FTE student, or FTE instructional salary cost, equals the FTE instructional salary cost per student credit hour times 30 for undergraduate students, and times 24 for graduate students.

This model serves as the basis for the regression analysis performed by the Commission staff (see page 5).
